The Zikmund Era 1955-1972: The Golden Age of Blue and Gold Football (part III)

bigger foe, only losing the game themselves by committing costly errors. As the outstanding 1963 season came to a close for the Antelopes, the accolades came pouring in for both players and coach. The *Omaha World-Herald* once again honored Coach Zikmund as Coach of the Year and the NAIA named him District 11 Coach of the Year, which automatically qualified him for NAIA National Coach of the Year. Loper quarterback Dick Butolph and talented receiver Jim Irwin were both selected as All-Americans, with Butolph being drafted by the Ottawa Roughriders of the Canadian League and Irwin continuing his career with the Los Angeles Rams. As a tribute to the successful 1963 coaches and players, the Blue and Gold faculty, staff, students, and many organizations on campus contributed money so the Antelope football team could make the trip to California and watch the Prairie View A&M Panthers lose the NAIA National Championship. As a testament to how talented the Panthers were, they had five of their players drafted into the National Football League.

Not being disappointed by their heartbreaking loss to Prairie View A&M during the 1963 season, the Antelopes continued to have unprecedented success as they won the NCC crown the following year in 1964. Ten players from this team were all-star NCC selections and in 1965 quarterback Neil Kaup broke two Kearney State College (KSC) passing records as he led the Antelopes to another NCC co-championship. Kaup would later have his name added to the list of All-Americans when he received the honor for his performance at safety. Kaup lost his starting job at quarterback after three-time All-American baseball star Rich Osentowski became the head signal caller in 1966. Although this two-sport star was tabbed as an honorable mention All-American in football, it was Lannie Shelmadine and Lee Jacobsen who led the Blue &

Gold that year as the team garnered the NAIA rushing title averaging over 370 yards rushing per game, which is still a school record. This team broke school records by amassing an amazing 4,376 rushing yards for the season and 599 yards in a single game against the Chadron Eagles. The Lopers would not have been as successful in their ground attack as they were if it were not for the play of Randy Rasmussen. This 6 feet 1 inch offensive lineman weighed in at 270 pounds and opened up huge holes in the opponents' defensive lines. Rasmussen was named an All-American while at Kearney and went on to win a Super Bowl with the New York Jets.

Zikmund's 1967 squad will forever be known as the team that was "undefeated and uninvited." Due in part to the return of Osentowski Jacobsen, and Shelmadine, Zikmund completed his fourth undefeated season since being named head coach in 1955. The NAIA rated the Blue and Gold football team as high as fourth place in their national rankings, yet they failed to invite the unbeaten Antelopes to the NAIA playoffs. Despite this overwhelming disappointment, the Antelopes maintained their pride knowing they were responsible for one of the most successful seasons in school history. During the season they led all Nebraska colleges and ranked second in the nation in rushing averaging 315 yards a game. As the season progressed, Osentowski found himself the leading scorer and second-leading rusher in the NAIA, while Kearney State's Keith Staehr led the nation in punting. Standout fullback and linebacker Lee



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Jacobsen was tabbed as an All-American, finished his career as second on the school's all-time scoring list, and was drafted by the New York Jets in 1968. Coach Zikmund characterized this season as having "tremendous school spirit," as is evident by the mass migrations of Kearney fans to away games and the 7,000 spectators who regularly attended the Antelopes' contests.

As Coach Zikmund's coaching career started to come to an end at Kearney State College, he finished in the same fashion as he began. From 1968 until his retirement from coaching in 1972, an average of more than 6,000 fans thronged to Foster Field as they cheered the Blue and Gold on to victory after victory. The Antelopes were awarded the NCC crown in 1968, ranked 13th in the nation in 1969, 8th in 1970, and outscored and outrushed their opponents during the 1971 season. Two superior athletes stand out during these last four years of Coach Zikmund's successful career. All-American tailback John "The Truck" Makovicka, father of former Husker fullbacks Joel and Jeff Makovicka, broke five all-time school rushing records and was named NAIA scoring champion during his senior year

in 1970. Of these records, Makovicka's single-season scoring record of 19 touchdowns in one season has yet to be broken. On the defensive side of the ball, safety Jim "The Pass Pirate" Zikmund, Coach Zikmund's son, was perhaps the most talented defensive back in school history. The honorable mention All-American set three all-time Antelope interception records and was selected by the Boston Patriots in the professional draft. With the added duties of being named Charlie Foster's successor as athletic director in 1970 and ever-dwindling leisure time, Coach Zikmund retired as the winningest football coach in school history at the end of the 1971 season. As he announced his retirement from coaching, Zikmund stated, "I'm sure I'll be just as much a part of the KSC athletic picture, without being an active coach." And indeed he was.

As athletic director, Coach Zikmund continued to keep a watchful eye over the athletic department until he ended his exceptional 32-year career with the college in 1987. Coach Zikmund worked just as hard off of the field as he did on to help better the sport of football during his career at Kearney. For example, the NAIA specially selected Zikmund to serve on a committee to help improve their national playoff system. In addition to this, Zikmund helped form the Kearney State Athletic Associates in 1974 and the Central States Intercollegiate Conference (CSIC) in 1976. Zikmund was also chosen to serve as the head of the CSIC Athletic Directors for three years. In honor of Coach Allen Zikmund's hard work and accomplishments, the University of Nebraska at Kearney Athletic Department dedicated a room that bears Zikmund's name in the

Health and Sports Center in the fall of 1992.

In conclusion, Coach Zikmund impelled the Blue and Gold football program to new heights that were never reached prior to his hiring, nor ever again after his retirement. Zikmund's winning teams regularly attracted more than 6,000 fans to their games and on one remarkable occasion over 8,300 gridiron enthusiasts
