The Zikmund Era (1955-1972: The Golden Age of Blue and Gold Football (part II)

With the Antelope's 1955 roster being completed by adding freshmen and transfer students, Coach Zikmund instructed the team's trainer, Chuck Bolton, to send out training schedules at the beginning of July in order to help prepare the gridders for fall preseason practices. Coach Zikmund also implemented the "two-platoon system" into the Antelope football program just prior to the start of the season. Under this system, Zikmund fielded a separate offensive and defensive unit. The offense and defense was comprised of two different "teams." This allowed each player to concentrate and focus on one objective and prevented them from tiring out. Coach Zikmund was able to utilize this system because he always had between 125 and 140 players out for football and "never cut anyone from the football team except for disciplinary reasons." He also established a "B" team from which he could bring the inexperienced players up to the varsity level after they had developed their skills from competing against other "B" teams. Also, Zikmund's "apprentice system," where an upper classman would take a freshman or sophomore of the same position as his apprentice, allowed these veteran juniors and seniors to step into the role of a teacher while they were on the field. As Coach Zikmund stated, the apprentice system, along with the other innovative ideas he used to better the football program at Kearney, "paid dividends." With their roster full, demanding practices completed, and an experienced coach to lead them, the Antelopes were ready to begin their 1955 season.

The 1955 season, Coach Zikmund's first with the Antelopes, proved to be one

of the most successful in school history. Zikmund's gridders lost only one conference game as Tom Osborne and the Hastings Broncos narrowly defeated the Antelopes by a score of 21-7. Regardless of the loss, the Blue and Gold

play of All-American Merlin Bachman and two-time All-American junior college transfer Ray Adams, the Antelopes snapped the Northern Teachers' 16-game winning streak giving Kearney its first-ever bowl game win. Coach Zikmund's inaugural season was capped off with him being named Coach of the Year by the Lincoln Journal and Star.

It was the successful 1955 season that first sparked a tremendous amount of school spirit and community support. After the game with the Doane Tigers, The Antelope reported that "it was indeed a thrilling sight to see a truly organized pep rally, complete with drums, school yells, and all the trimmings. This is the beginning of a new era for school spirit for Kearney State." The Student Council also congratulated the student body on their "allegiance to the school" and the Buck and Doe Pep Club was reorganized after it "had once been active on campus" years ago. As Coach Zikmund stated, "that season woke people up."

Coach Zikmund's Antelope squads continued to dominate their opponents as they were crowned NCC champions in 1956 and ranked second in 1957. With an undefeated season in 1956, Coach Zikmund was once again recognized as Coach of the Year by the Omaha World-Herald. Ten Antelope gridders were named to the 1957 NCC all-star team as the Blue & Gold reported that "school spirits soared to new heights this year." That year's Antelope defense held Midland Lutheran College to a mere 21 yards of total offense, which still remains a school record to this day. The only loss of the season came at the hands of the NCC champion Hastings Broncos, which snapped the Antelopes' 15-game winning streak—the longest in school history. At the end of the season, Coach Zikmund was asked to speak in front of 500 people about his innovative pro-style spread offense at the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics' (NAIA) meeting held in Kansas City, Missouri. Although the Nebraska State Teachers College had had unlimited success in the NCC since 1955, the 1958 team achieved impressive feats that surpassed even those of the previous three years.

Zikmund's 1958 squad amassed an impressive 9-0 record as they were crowned NCC co-champions along with the Chadron Eagles. The NAIA rated the Blue and Gold as high as fourth in their national poll out of more than 350 teams. "Zik's" gridders outscored their opponents 389-42, a modern-day scoring record, and were led by University of Nebraska transfer Claire Boroff. The first-team All-American running back repeated as NCC scoring champion and was named to the first team of the NAIA all-star team. In addition to these accomplishments, the "Comet," as he was known, also still holds the school

record for his 97-yard touchdown run against Dana College. The 1958 football team chose to turn down an offer to play in the Mineral Water Bowl hoping they would be invited to play in the NAIA Holiday Bowl in Florida. Unfortunately, the invitation never came. However, the season ended on a good note when Coach Zikmund was honored as Coach of the Year, for the third time in his career, by the *Lincoln Journal and Star*. Also, at the end of the season President Cushing announced the college would be installing new steel bleachers to replace the twenty-year-old wooden ones due to increased worries that they may collapse in the future. This was a legitimate concern because during this past season, as *The Antelope* reported, "The stands had been jam-packed with spectators."

The Blue and Gold continued to roll through their opponents as they played their way to the top of the NCC for the next four years. The team won the NCC championship in 1959 and in 1962, while they were runners-up in 1960
