## Mayor Joseph C. Tye's V-E Day Proclamation By: Nathan Tye

V-E Day (May 8, 1945) marked the unconditional surrender of Nazi forces in Europe. Newspapers across the nation celebrated the defeat of Nazi Germany, but in Kearney the joy was muted. At 8 a.m. the laundry whistle and fire siren announced the end of hostilities. Many businesses closed and the high school band held a short concert downtown. A dusting of snow fell. The Hub reported, "few people were on the streets." Most of Kearney's citizens likely heard President Harry Truman's morning radio address. He called on the nation to bring the victory in Europe to the war in the Pacific.

Mayor Joseph C. Tye issued his own address after Truman on KGFW. In his address he makes clear victory in Europe is a large step towards ending the war but many trials and tribulations awaited the nation and Kearney as fighting continued across the Pacific. Many young men and women in Kearney were in uniform and the presence of the Army Air Field brought the entire community face-to-face with the conflict on a daily basis. For Mayor Tye this sacrifice was personal, his eldest son Joseph "Bud" Tye was preparing for deployment to the Pacific and would eventually partake in the occupation of Japan. First elected by write-in vote in 1943 and reelected in 1945, Tye's mayoral tenure was deeply tied to the war and continued afterwards when he spearheaded community efforts for the newly created Air Force to maintain its presence at the airfield. Although it was quoted briefly in the Kearney Hub that day, the entire address is reproduced here in its entirety for the first time since May 8, 1945.

"As we listened to the proclamation of our President this morning, spoken in true Midwestern, common sense style – plain, matter of the fact, sincere – a part of the weight lifted from the shoulders of our people.

This is V-E Day. Our President made no mention of celebration – or cessation of business.


I am personally proud of Kearney and her people. We heard the news yesterday, as did many other people. All day our people continued business as usual; there was no trend toward celebration, hilarity or leaving the job upon news unconfirmed. Men and women going about their daily tasks gave expressions of desire and hope that V-E Day was here but their faces also gave clear evidence of solemnity, sincerity and determination.

As our President brought us the official news this morning, we all were relieved and happy but there came at the same time a realization of the stupendous tasks ahead. What is Gen. Eisenhower doing today? What of the job of our men in Germany at this hour? As they lay down the tools and implements of war, they take on the greatest task ever undertaken by any peoples anywhere – the handling of millions of surrendered troops, millions of civilians in enemy territory, thousands of prisoners – both of war and political – America – Nebraska – Kearney men are today taking part in a task never before undertaken – one which will not only permit hilarity and celebration, but which will DEMAND the greatest of human skill, ingenuity and soberness, if we are to do OUR USUAL Grand American job and bring a chaotic world back to orderly peace.

We thought, as our President spoke, of that neighbor whose soldier will not return — even though there is peace on the Western front. This day will not be one of celebration in that home. Let us see to it that the day is spent to ease the pain and care of our people who have given such sacrifice. They are entitled to the deepest and sincerest of thoughts and consideration today. This day they shall never forget — let us see to it that their memory of it is solemn, sincere, prayerful.


We thought then as our President struck the key — note of his proclamation of that neighbor and friend whose boy today is sloshing his way ashore on some unknown Pacific Island. He is loaded down with his pack, he is walking into an unknown land against the most vicious, dastardly and treacherous foe — he is under murderous fire, cut off from home, yes — cut off from supplies — living on what he finds in this unknown land and what his buddies may be able to drop to him from the air — he is there to FIGHT or die. He fights for YOU — he fights for me. One side step by any of us at home may mean a slip for him — one moment wasted here may mean his life there — this day is not Victory for him. It is our task in recognizing V-E Day to think of him.

As I passed along the streets of Kearney this morning, there was no evidence of celebration. Kearney is sober, solemn, sincere, determined to finish the job ahead. Our amusement places and taverns are closed today. Voluntarily closed. I take this opportunity to thank those men, the owners and operators of these business places, for their fine judgment, their support of Kearney and her spirit on this V-E Day.



Today Kearney pauses — our schools are closed this morning, our business houses are closed until 1 P.M. We are giving THANKS — thanks from the depths of our very souls, for this Victory. In true Midwestern fashion, our thanks is sincere, sober and with a view ahead to the end of this war. All Kearney churches are holding appropriate services today — there are several such services beginning at 10 this morning — there will be others this evening.

Let us all go to the church of our choice and join in a solemn moment of thanks and prayer to our Almighty God. Thanks for our deliverance thus far and prayer for full and complete peace – prayer for a world peace – coming out of this war – that there may never be any more war."
